PALGRAVE BONFIRE ON THE GREEN

As we approach another Guy Fawkes Night, some residents may recall the long-standing village tradition of hosting a bonfire on the Green. This tradition, however, was not without its share of controversy, as seen in various newspaper articles from 1984 and 1985, including a detailed piece in the Palgrave Star.

In November 1984, despite a threat of prosecution, the annual bonfire was lit without incident. However, tensions arose when a fire prevention officer deemed the bonfire a safety hazard, claiming the authorities had not been informed. Complaints had been made, and upon inspection, the Fire Department found it to be dangerous. Although a contractor was hired to remove the bonfire, the work could not be carried out, and the festivities went on as planned.

The core issue was that, starting as early as August, people from outside the village had been dumping rubbish around the site, making the bonfire difficult to control. It became clear that more oversight and official responsibility were needed for future events.

An article in the Diss Express, dated October 25th, 1985, described last-ditch efforts to save the tradition. Mid Suffolk District Council had posted warnings on the Green, stating the bonfire would be dismantled unless someone took responsibility and arranged insurance cover. That's when Judy Ward of The Paddocks stepped up. She organised the necessary insurance and obtained approval from both the police and fire services. With everything in place, the council stood down their workmen, and the bonfire went ahead.

Unfortunately, the tradition did not endure much longer. Anecdotal accounts suggest that during one of the last events, the fire brigade was called out to extinguish a smouldering roof at a nearby property, marking the beginning of the end for the village bonfire.

Though the bonfire tradition has since faded, you can still spot the site where it once stood—a raised area just in front of The Paddocks, serving as a reminder of those spirited Guy Fawkes Nights from the past.

Bins at the Cemetery:

The black bin at the cemetery is for the usual *unrecyclable* waste, the same as we have at home. We would appreciate it if any dead flowers / green waste etc from graves and such are put in the compost bin located in the car park. Dog poo bags should not be put in the black bin. There is a specific dog waste bin outside the cemetery with disposable bags provided by the Parish Council. Please use this for your pet's waste. We pay BMSDC an annual fee specifically for these dog waste bins so please use them, not the black bin. Thank you for your consideration.

Parking in Palgrave:

Please would drivers parking on Lion Road & near the school be aware of the guidelines of the Highway code which states: Parking at junctions is NOT allowed, rule 243 refers which says DO NOT stop or park:

- near a school entrance
- opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space
- on a bend

Parking, particularly at school drop off / pick up time is becoming more and more of a hazard with vehicles unable to see past the junctions due to parked cars. Please remember that the safety of our school children is paramount. As such, we all need clear lines of view when driving vehicles otherwise there may be a serious accident and nobody wants this! We also don't want to call in officers to issue parking tickets, a heavy handed approach isn't helpful and so we earnestly ask all parents driving to / from school to be aware of other road users and show some consideration. We appreciate parking is a problem and we are actively trying to find a resolution but we also ask **you** to help **us** by parking appropriately. Thank you in advance for your co-operation.



BOTESDALE HEALTH CENTRE PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP (PPG)

Question of the month to the Team at Botesdale Health Centre

Question: Please can you explain the different options available for requesting repeat prescriptions? Are there options you would recommend for someone who is registered for online services and someone who is not?

Answer: Requesting repeats can be done online, through Patient Access or NHS App (the latter would be the preferred option). Alternatively, patients can request by putting it in writing with name, date of birth and medication they wish to order in the letter box at the front of the surgery. With the new system, within the dispensary, we do not automatically print repeats slips anymore as we are trying to reduce paper. If patients wish for one to be printed for them, the counter staff will be happy to do so. Please remember we need at least 5 working days' notice before your prescription/s will be ready to collect. We also offer an automatic service for patients who are on regular medication, if you are interested and would like more information please speak to a member of the dispensary team. We only accept telephone ordered orders for delivery to housebound patients only.

Are you currently waiting for hospital care?

A word from Rosedale Bereavement Support......

I love this time of year, Autumn being my favourite season. I channel my inner Dane, embrace the Hygge and take every opportunity to enjoy blustery walks in the chilly air, followed by warming food and drinks by the fire. There is nothing quite like cosying up in a comfy armchair with a blanket and a good book or magazine. I think I share much in common with hedgehogs because I like to hibernate when the season of falling leaves arrives!

I know that not everyone shares my preference and it seems that most people I talk to, lament the end of summer. Many dread the end of long, warm days and the opportunity to be out and about as much as possible. This is especially true of those who are bereaved, particularly those who now find themselves living alone.

Motivation can wane and doing anything can feel like more of an effort. However, it is more important than ever at this time of year, to make self-care a priority.

Self-care can sound a bit selfish but it really just means taking time to look after yourself and doing things that make you feel recharged and warm inside. It might involve spending time alone, to rest and relax or reaching out to engage with others.

So, this Autumn, make time for self-care: Meet with others, enjoy some good food, watch an uplifting film, read a good book, have a long soak in a fragrant bubble bath or whatever else makes you feel warm inside.






